Message from Mr Adams

I write at the end of the first half of the Summer Term and in some regards the situation in schools is no clearer than that before Easter. Missing the entirety of this first part of the summer term has been devastating for those of us who were beginning to feel that the school community was really starting to come together. Getting to know our pupils as individuals has always been a priority for me and it is beyond disappointing to have lost this time with them.

Currently, Primary schools are preparing to receive Reception, Year 1 and Year 6 pupils into school from the 1st June, although the final decision regarding this will not be taken by the Government until the 28th May when the most recent scientific advice will be assessed. For schools and parents awaiting the announcement, the uncertainty is difficult to manage. For those of us with children in different year groups, that uncertainty is even more profound. Currently we know the Government's hope is that all Primary pupils will receive some schooling before the summer break although at present the details of what that might look like are unclear.

For all of us at Pix Brook Academy, it will be fantastic to have our pupils back in school. Our challenge is how to achieve this while adhering to the safety guidelines. Safe social distancing is achievable by splitting our three classes into five, making use of the other two teaching spaces, the staggering of breaks and lunches are possible as are routines for cleaning. What is clear is that when pupils do return, school will not be the same as before the outbreak of COVID-19. We have produced our plan for the return of pupils and when we are advised that it is safe to do so we will provide more information, we can only hope we hear soon. All the staff at PBA are working on the basis that the children will be back with us before the summer, we are just waiting to be told when.

During the course of the lock-down, I know parents have been working fantastically hard to support their children at home. I am well aware of the difficulties associated with teaching your own children and have nothing but admiration for those of you who have persisted. It may seem a thankless task but please be assured you will reap the rewards at some point in the future when you least expect it! Your children may not thank you now but in years to come they will appreciate your efforts. I hope that the materials and resources we have provided have been useful. Trying to balance the need to provide educational activities without adding pressure to families has been something of a tightrope. Hopefully our use of Google Classroom, enabling communication with teachers, regular phone calls and emails for pupils, class Zoom meetings and weekly material on the website, have done something to mitigate the challenge of doing schoolwork at home.

The Summer Term is a fantastically busy time in schools. We are currently working with our lower school colleagues to put together the classes for next year.

Fortunately, we had made all our teaching appointments for September and I have been in communication with each of them. They are all looking forward to starting and have been preparing for the start of the new term and looking forward to seeing their new classes.

Unfortunately, some things are less simple. As you may expect the impact of the pandemic is felt in a host of areas. Currently it appears that the usual step-up days will not be possible. Instead we are planning for teachers to meet with parents and pupils individually (at a safe social distance). I am also exploring the possibility of a virtual tour of the new school. We might also miss our normal end of term celebrations, if this is the case I will ensure that when pupils do return we have an appropriate event to mark the end of our first (very eventful!) year at the school

Inevitably there has also been an impact on the construction of the permanent school. Much of the work has progressed throughout the period of lock-down, however some elements have been impacted by the pandemic and this might result in a delay to the handing over of the school. Currently plans are in place to provide alternative accommodation for pupils in September if required. If that is the case we will continue to use our current site and either have accommodation at Etonbury Academy or have temporary classrooms on our current site. I will provide more details when the situation has been confirmed, I anticipate knowing the decision at the beginning of July. I will obviously be extremely disappointed for pupils, parents and staff if we find ourselves in this position but as the recipient of the school, there is little that can be done. Given the life changing impact the virus has had on so many lives, it seems churlish to be anything other than disappointed. Currently I know that Willmott Dixon and the local authority are doing everything possible to enable us to access the school at the start of term, it remains to be seen if circumstances conspire against us. If they do, it will be a short-term delay and the plan will be to be in the new school before the end of the year and my focus is on ensuring that pupils receive an outstanding experience regardless of the building they are occupying.

As we enter the May half term break, I would like to wish you a well-deserved rest. We are not expecting pupils to undertake schoolwork during this period. Trying to maintain the notion of a yearly cycle is important and while the normal holidays and family visits might not be possible we should still try to demarcate this period in some way. No doubt we will continue to receive updates over the next few weeks and please be assured that as soon as I have any further information I will share this with you.

Thank you again for your support and I hope the weather remains kind and everyone remains well!

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










Other News

School Uniform: Message from Total Clothing



Sizing Days

Due to the Government Guidelines and the safety of staff, parents and pupils, we feel the Sizing Day is not something we can offer currently.

The main advantage of this day is to allow pupils to try on the clothing. However due to the risk of the virus travelling onto the clothing and additional pupils trying on the same garments, we would not be able to allow trying on of the uniform.

Therefore, we feel without this advantage and with the addition of social distancing, it would be safer and more effective to support parents as much as we can with the online ordering and showroom offering.

Booklets and Sizing Videos

To support this, we are creating a booklet and sizing video bespoke to Pix Brook Academy offering advice on how to measure your child. This would be the same measurements we advise taking on the Sizing Day and parents can do this in the safety of their own home. In the video I will explain the Pix Brook Academy Uniform requirements (with dressed mannequins on display), how to measure your child and any extra hints and tips specific to your uniform.

We are also offering the FREE home delivery throughout June to allow parents to size and order their uniform in plenty of time before the start of school in September.

We will also be as flexible as we can with the returns. Any returns will be isolated for at least 72 hours before they are put back on the shelf to sell.

If any parents are struggling and have specific concerns with sizing, we will always have our Customer Services team available on Live Chat, email and telephone. We are also considering arranging Zoom calls one to one with any parents that would like further assistance and advice with the uniform.

Appointments and Showroom

Parents will still be able to visit our showroom and shop in Peterborough if they wish to. To monitor the number of parents/pupils we will have in the showroom, we will be asking parents to make appointments throughout the summer to visit the shop. There will be a link for parents to book online. These appointments will most likely start from mid-end of June. Further information on this will be sent shortly.








Safeguarding at Pix Brook Academy

The safeguarding and well-being of pupils remains the top priority for Pix Brook Academy.

Even during this time of lockdown and the temporary closure of our school building, the well-being and safeguarding of our pupils has constantly remained at the forefront for Pix Brook Academy staff. Our pastoral and safeguarding responsibilities towards our pupils has not changed; we simply have had to execute our duties in a slightly different manner.



We fully appreciate that for some pupils, the current situation within the country can be worrying and a little daunting, especially the impact of being away from friends, missing out on the hustle and bustle of daily school life and the routine that school brings. With this in mind, the safeguarding team have kept in contact with those pupils that may just need that little bit of extra support, albeit over the phone. These 'check in' calls have allowed parents/carers to update the safeguarding team on how their child is getting on and for us to check if there is any additional support we could provide or signpost parents/carers towards.

We have continued to work alongside the families of pupils whom we were providing additional pastoral support for before the lockdown restrictions came in to force. This has also involved weekly 'check in' phone calls to discuss how things have been going for the pupil. The safeguarding team have been utterly amazed with how resilient our pupils have been and how, in many cases, they have just been getting on with things and making the best of 'lockdown life'.



To allow our pupils to see and speak to their classmates and teachers, Mrs Pearce has organised hugely successful Zoom class meetings. For us as staff, it has been lovely to see and speak to our pupils and more importantly for them to see their classmates and share stories and things they have achieved. We know from feedback how much our pupils have enjoyed the Zoom class meetings. These class meetings would not have happened without the organisation and commitment of Mrs Pearce and the dedication of staff at Pix Brook Academy.

For school staff, seeing and speaking to pupils on a daily basis allows us to easily pick up on and address any worries or issues that our pupils may be facing.
