This year we were able to hold a sports day which was brilliant fun. We are nearly at the point of being able to use the field fully and when we are able to do so this will truly transform the way events of this nature can be held. Even without access to this area we are fortunate that we have great facilities and the pupils were able to enjoy a day of games, races, table tennis and generally have the type of day that we all remember when we were at school. It was dry and not too hot, what more could you want? Pupils behaved impeccably and competed in great spirits as expected.

Last week we had Harry Potter day. This came as a result of Year 5 pester power and as parents the world over know, young people are experts at wearing down the adults by continually making "reasonable" requests! This day was a classic example and when pupils developed a deliverable curriculum I finally capitulated. A great deal of credit must go to these pupils who recognised that a day of this nature must include the learning normally associated with school but could be done in a slightly different way. It was great to have Mr Goode, ex Head of Science at Samuel Whitbread Academy come over as our own head of potions and deliver a lesson of smells, smoke and flames to the Year 6 pupils.

The practical experiment of screaming jelly babies will long be remembered. Year 5 pupils had their own version of Professor Snape in the form of Mr Fleckney who helped the pupils make their own potions, (predominantly made of jelly and smarties).

All great fun. English and art lessons were also included and it was great day to see the pupils in their Harry Potter outfits.

The last week of term was planned to include the "WOW" days traditional in KS2. Unfortunately, COVID-19 had one last sting in the tail for us before the end of term. As we have seen the rates of infection have accelerated significantly in the last few weeks, I had still hoped that we would continue to avoid a case and that the term could finish normally. We had been both careful and lucky to avoid an outbreak since returning to school but on the last Friday of the year a positive case resulted in a number of pupils and staff having to self-isolate. Everyone knows there is nothing that can be done in these circumstances but it does not stop everyone from feeling disappointed and "flat" to finish the term in this way. Our pupils have been superb all year. All staff have thoroughly enjoyed working with both them and parents and carers throughout the year and to have the final week so cruelly curtailed for some is so disappointing.

It has been the most incredible year. A new school, new pupils, new staff, and the start of the journey that will be Pix Brook Academy. To do all this in the face of a global pandemic has been truly challenging in the most unexpected ways. As I reflect on this year I am struck by the fortitude of staff, parents and pupils who have coped so magnificently with all that has been thrown their way. Science

Blyton class made "Blood Soup" in their science lesson. This followed on from their research into the four parts of blood. They added white blood cells (marshmallows), red blood cells (Cheerios and food colouring) and platelets (grains of rice). Lots of fun was had by all as they also created plasma.







Year 6 had a fantastic practical science lesson with Mr D Goode from Samuel Whitbread Academy. They were able to use Bunsen Burners to try and separate the salt from the salt water solution they had been given.

Working in teams and following clear instructions the children were able to witness evaporation and condensation in action through the process of distillation. To finish the session they also were able to observe a heart dissection and allow them to see the amazing organ that keeps us alive every day.

It was great to see their enthusiasm for the lesson and to hear that so many are looking forward to Science in Year 7.

Luckily the weather did not put a dampener on the activities that went on at school for our really wild day which has been planned as part of the #30dayswild challenge run by The Wildlife Trusts





Child Safety Online:

A practical guide for parents and carers whose children are using social media

Why children use social media

- · Entertainmen
- Belonging
- Confidence

Social networking is hugely popular.

Many young people are sophisticated in the way they use social media apps and webstes, talloring their communication for different audiences, and accessing them from a range of devices including smartphones, tablets, and games consoles.

But social media, like all forms of public But social modal, like al forms of public communication, comes with some risks. Not all of these risks turn into actual problems, and if children never face any risks, they never learn how to deal with them. By helping your child understand what the risks are, you can play a big part in preventing them from turning into problems.

Understand the risks children may need to deal with

What they could see or do:

- Seeing or sharing of violent, sexual and pornographic content.
- Inaccurate or false information and extreme views
- Over-sharing of personal informa



Who they might meet:

- People who might bully, Intimidate or frighten
- People posing behind fake profiles for:
- Sexual grooming and
- Blackmall and extortion



- Fear of missing out leading to excessive use or exaggeration
- Getting upset by things they have seen and being uncertain

about what to do

- Engaging, or being pressure into engaging in more risky behaviour either by accident or by design
- Developing unrealistic, and perhaps depressing ideals of body image and gender
- Becoming subject to peer pressure or interactions that are intense or too difficult to handle













Practical tips to help minimise the risks your child might face

It's good practice for apps and websites to have safety advice and well-designed safety features which can make a real difference to how safe your child will be when using them.

Work through safety and privacy features on the apps that your child is using, or might use. Make sure they understand the point of these and how to use them. Don't be put off by believing your child knows more than you: the tools are actually quite easy to manage.

- Ask them to show you which social media apps they use and what they like about them. Talk about how they use them and what makes them so engaging.
- Explain how you can use privacy settings to make sure only approved friends can see posts & images.
- Check If any of their apps have
- · Show them how to report offensive
- Check 'tagging' settings so that when others are posting or sharing photos online, your child's identity is not revealed. Also, get people's consent before sharing photos.
- Encourage your child to come and talk to you if they see anything that upsets them.

Keep talking and stay involved

In a mobile age, children can't be completely protected, even by the best privacy controls; another child may use different settings. So it's important to keep talking to your child about the implications of social media.

Getting a sense of what they think is a useful place to start; you may be surprised by how much thought they may have given to the issue Encourage your child to think carefully about the way they, and others behave online, and how they might deal with difficult situation

- · People may not always be who they say they are online: how can this co
- . Why is it unwise to meet anyone in the real world that you've only ever met online?
- always be captured and broadcast.
- · People present themselves differently online - do they really look like that? Are they always having that good a time?
- · Be aware that screens, and especially being anonymous, can lead people to say things they wouldn't say to someone's face.
- What does being a good friend and a Ilkeable person online look like?
- There can be pressure to be part of a particular group online or to be seen to be following a certain set of ideas. your own decisions?

- If you are scared or worried about going home


There are special organisations you can contact if you need to speak to someone when you are not at school. Their job is to also listen, support and help you.
