Our data shows that our idea is good because we completed a survey. One of our questions is: Do you think that a local volta pitch would benefit the local area? The most responses were yes



GEOGRAPHY

This half term has felt like it has gone very quickly but reflecting on this half term reminds me of the amount of work that has already been achieved in geography. In all year groups the children have been focussing on the SPICESS concepts which includes:

Space- where a place is
Place- physical geography
Interconnections- how the world is linked
Environment- the human impact on the world
Sustainability- capacity to use the natural resources
Scale- comparing the sizes of places and problems

The students have used these concepts in context to their topics, the **year 5's** have been learning about the rainforest, **year 6** have been campaigning to improve our local area, **year 7** have been practicing mapping skills and **year 8** have been developing their knowledge of Africa.

As a department it is exciting to speak to the teachers and hear about how the children are enjoying their topics and looking in their books I am really proud to see some fantastic work. In the next half term, we have lots more to look forward to including a visit from our local MP Mr Fuller, this links with the campaign that the year 6 children have been working on, they will have the opportunity to speak directly with Mr Fuller and share their ideas for how our community could be improved.

Finally, another exciting addition to the humanities department is the 'Humanities hero award', one child per year group will be awarded with this award once a term. The aim of the award is to reward the students who have really embraced their learning for each humanities subject. The only challenge is to narrow down the winner as there are so many exceptional pieces of work produced already!


European Day of Languages Sept 26 2022

We have had a great start to the year in ICT with lots of different activities happening across the year groups. In Year 5, the students have been learning all about computer systems and how different computers can communicate messages to each other – using the skills they have learnt to complete a silent project. Year 6 have been expanding on this idea and thinking about different methods of technical communication, thinking about the pros and cons of each. One lesson required them to create a paper-based website for Pix Brook with some outstanding results. In Year 7, the children were tasked with creating a PowerPoint all about Cyberbullying and how to prevent it. Some of the speeches were amazing! Finally, up in Year 8 they have been very technical this half-term. They have been learning all about the inner workings of a computer system – it has been a very difficult topic, but the Year 8s have shown their perseverance skills and got through it!

Students from Y7 and Y8 were invited to sign up attend some lunchtime art workshops this half term. They have been using air dry clay to create some Halloween themed crafts and learning how to use the medium to create both 2D and 3D pieces.





Year 8's continue good form

The year 8 football team went into this week ready to continue recent good performances. So far this year the team has lost, drawn and won, but performances have been of a high standard regardless of results. This week was derby week, against local rivals Etonbury. A good crowd was on show from both schools, with an air of anticipation of what was to come. The game plan was simple for the year 8's, win your individual battles and frustrate the opposition in key parts of the game.



The first half started at a fast pace, with both teams cancelling each other out in the midfield and at the back. Neither team could get a foothold in the game with both Nathan and Charlie working hard to assert dominance in the middle. Strong challenges from Harjevan and James stopped most of the potential attacks that did materialise for Etonbury, with Harry playing a good sweeping role at left back. As the first half progressed PBA began to take the ascendency, some great skill on the right wing from Alim and fast running began to stretch out the Etonbury defence. A breakthrough! The in form Izaiah found some room between the touch tight defenders, breaking away with the ball towards the 18 yard box, the keeper rushed, and with calm composure our in form striker dinked the ball over the keeper and into the net; Pix Brook 1 Etonbury 0.

The first half came then went, with the message for the second half being the same; win your battles. Louie and Josh S started the second half well, cutting out attacks on the wing. Josh S produced some useful balls behind the defensive back line stretching out the Etonbury defence. Gabriel, Hayden and Liam had a solid game at the back making sure they won their battles on the pitch. Mason began to influence the game dropping slightly deeper to get the ball. It was however Etonbury who began to take the game to Pix Brook. An error at the back led to a quick Etonbury goal, leaving the game yet again in the balance. After some further back and forth, Etonbury again went onto the attack, again finding the back of the net; Pix Brook 1 Etonbury 2. The game entered into the final 10 minutes, PBA began to take back the advantage of what had been a brilliant encounter on all areas of the pitch. It was PBA who had the final say, with Mason striking from 16 yards finding the roof of the net! Final score, Pix Brook 2 Etonbury 2.

Year 6 football team crowned district champions!

Our Year 6 football team created a moment in history this week by winning our first ever league title, beating reigning champions Arnold in a top of the table clash in a five-goal thriller. Both teams were unbeaten this season, however Arnold were the slight favourites going into the game having not lost a match throughout Year 5 and 6, topping the table on goal difference this year, meaning we needed a win to clinch the title. We started the game impressively, forcing the Arnold defence into mistakes with excellent runs and pressure from Remy, Ethan and Freddie P. Luke was pulling the strings as usual in midfield, demonstrating intelligence on the ball when to pass forward and when to recycle play, meaning we had good possession of the ball in the early stages. Arnold began to find their passing range and it took several challenges from Eli, who put in a phenomenal performance covering in defence, to prevent the deadlock being opened. Equally, we also had opportunities on the counter midway through the first half and it was against the run of play that Arnold took the lead from a perfectly whipped in ball from the right hand side which the striker nodded home from close range. Sensing the opportunity to score a second, Arnold continued to attack our left hand side but Blake, who has been solid all season, showed great composure dealing with the threat.



With the game going back and forth, we were awarded a corner, which was not cleared and it fell to top goal-scorer Ethan who drilled the ball across the keeper into the bottom corner with his weak foot to equalise. Moments later, we almost scored a second from a beautifully curled in corner from Remy which fell to Freddie P who volleyed in to the side netting. It was Arnold, nonetheless, who restored their lead with a carbon copy of the first goal, another cross which we failed to deal with and the glancing header left Ralf stranded. With the interval looming, it was time for another Pix Brook comeback. All season we have stressed the importance of pressing as a team and we were rewarded when Remy closed down the defender, whose clearance fell to Freddie P to fire home from close distance. Arnold began to panic in possession and with a smash and grab end to the first half, we took a deserved lead after Freddie P hunted down the defender and blocked his pass back, rounding the keeper to tap in to the empty net to go into half time 3-2 up.



The half time team talk was our most important of the season, as we knew Arnold would be firing on all cylinders second half. It was a case of who wanted it most and our boys did not disappoint. In the second half we faced wave after wave of attacks, calmly dealt with by Kier at the back, with Will and Alfie offering tremendous support in midfield protecting our back line. Freddie D was a brilliant outlet for us under pressure, who time and again held the ball up to give our defensive line a breather, while Harry continued to pose a threat on the wing with his pace and directness. The tension was mounting as the play continued, when a deflected cross looked sure to go in as an own goal only for Ralf to show his reflexes and parry the ball away for a corner. From the resulting set piece, the ball fell on the six yard box and with bodies on the line we closed down Arnold's best opportunity of the half. With ten minutes to play, we were not sure whether we could withstand the Arnold onslaught and it was Luca who produced the defensive moment of the season, with the goal gaping, Luca flung himself in front of the striker to block a certain goal. With Arnold dispirited, we started playing our own fluent, attacking football and should have wrapped the game up with two clear one-on-one efforts at goal, however the Arnold keeper remained tall and made two fantastic saves. It was just a case now of seeing the game out, with Arnold throwing everything forward, we showed the opposition everything that we stood for; heart, determination and teamwork. Despite this, we faced one more heart in the mouth situations when Arnold were put through on goal and slid the ball past Ralf to take the title away from us, only to be correctly ruled offside. With time up, the referee blew the final whistle of our league season and we were deservedly crowned district league champions. A special performance, from a special group of players. Final score: Arnold 2-3 Pix Brook. Players of the match = the whole squad.

Well done Rosa who has recently received the results from 2 dance exams she took over the Summer. She received a distinction in both her tap and street exams. In her street she scored 98/100!


