#### Welcome to this term's PBA Press!

As I have often mentioned before, schools are generally required to split their time and thinking between the creative and the mundane. There are always jobs to be done, organising hundreds of young people is akin to a military operation on a daily basis, albeit one that is very weather dependent! In schools we spend every moment trying to fit tasks and jobs into very set periods of time and this approach does not always support the creative thinking that is sometimes necessary when developing something as large and varied as a school. That is particularly the case when the school in question is still growing at a very fast pace.

Some of the more perfunctory yet critical tasks this term have included the appointment of new staff for next year. Two primary teachers, two Maths, Science, English, Music, Drama, DT, Geography, MFL and History. We are hoping to appoint computing early next term and then will move onto support staff. We have undertaken a full programme of assessments across all year groups, a full programme of observations of all staff, a full round of book looks, a review of the primary curriculum and developed both the long term and medium-term curriculum plans. Mid-year performance management is progressing and staff wellbeing is being developed making use of expertise within the Trust. These activities are the type of tasks all schools are managing while continuing to focus on the key priority of teaching and learning and ensuring that pupils are making at least good progress.

In addition to these tasks, pupils have been able to experience a variety of activities beyond the classroom, these have included the RAF STEM day, Fossils workshop, Young Voices, Planets in the solar system experience, World Book Day, Red Nose Day, Science week and the associated trip to the Space centre. We have had parents' evenings across all year groups, a whole host of sporting events after school and have also launched our Ski trip and PGL trip. Just this week, I had Head Teacher reward film for those pupils who have a clear license to learn for the term: KS3 enjoyed 'Antman' and Year 6 James Corden's version of 'Peter Rabbit', all with popcorn and juice.

We also have some new plans and are preparing for next year. There will be changes in the KS3 offer at lunchtimes, providing pupils with greater choice and more grab and go options. We have had a number of suppliers in school and pupils have had the opportunity to feedback on their thoughts. The primary provision will benefit from some adjustments to teacher rooms so that the KS2 provision is even more coherent with greater subject expertise dispersed within the team. Subject leads are in the process of researching and developing the curriculum offer for Year 9 so that all pupils are provided with clear pathways through the different subjects in preparation for the GCSE courses. The timetable is also progressing making sure that our desire to maintain a coherent experience for pupils is achieved.

Next term will be the same. The work to prepare our pupils for the next step in their education, in addition to the preparation for September and our new cohort of pupils will ramp up. That is the nature of education and keeps us all on our toes.

Have a fantastic break. Your children have been superb and deserve to be spoilt this Easter.

- If you are scared or worried about going home


There are special organisations you can contact if you need to speak to someone when you are not at school. Their job is to also listen, support and help you.
