Message from Mr Adams

Once again it has been an eventful few weeks in the life of Pix Brook Academy. Perhaps the most exciting event was the visit to the permanent site on the 31st October. Fortunately, the rain stayed away and we had an opportunity to meet the senior staff from Willmott Dixon who talked to the pupils about the construction site. There is no doubt it is exciting for us all to see the huge change in just a couple of weeks. Seeing the diggers move around, going into the site office and seeing where the staff work and hearing from the project manager about how the site will progress was a great experience for us all. I have been really pleased with how Willmott Dixon have chosen to engage with the school, they have been really inclusive and I hope this bodes well for the future.

As always it is fascinating to listen to the questions of 9-year-old children. The excitement shown when the computer model showed a trampoline in the gym was a site to behold. Never mind the huge new school that's being built: there's going to be a trampoline! The pupils have now had their first visit to the site and we have more planned. They have planted some daffodils, some even the right way round and we have an assembly being run by WD later this month. It's a good start and while no one can promise there won't be a hitch, we have at least seen genuine engagement and commitment from the contractors to work with us.

The other big stand out moment for me happens every other Friday. This is where I take the opportunity to meet with pupils selected by their teacher who have been working as hard as they can and doing their best. We have juice and biscuits, discuss the week and what is happening over the weekend. This is at the core of my belief in the purpose of education: try your best, if you do that no one can ask any more. I am delighted to say that teachers are struggling to choose who to send to me, so many are working fantastically well. These conversations are priceless, pupils are interested, loquacious and I have to say have fascinating insights. It's a real highlight for me.

I have also had an opportunity to meet with some parents. A really useful meeting was held to help me understand what more we might do to improve the educational experience of our pupils. Out of the meeting we agreed that the development of the Pix Brook parent's association (PBPA) would be a welcome addition to the school. If you are interested in being part of a likeminded body of parents to help provide additional support for the school, please let me know via the school email. I am hoping to be able to organise the inaugural meeting before Christmas.

We have a few events coming up over the next few weeks. I am delighted to say we have our Remembrance Day organised. A representative from St Mary's Church will be holding the assembly. Lessons in the morning will be different from usual and will appropriately focus on the sacrifice made by members of the armed forces. Please note as part of this day pupils who are members of cadets or scouts / guides can choose to wear their uniform for the day.

Finally, can I remind everyone that the school continues to offer homework club on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. These are free until 4pm and provide pupils with an opportunity to complete their homework at school. It continues to be very popular and staff are available to provide support if required. The purpose of this is to minimise the impact of homework on parents and enable pupils to complete their work at school. I am very keen that we develop the resilience and independence of pupils so that they have these attributes that will be so necessary to their education. There really should be no need for any pupil not to have completed their homework.

This week we are designing our own machine, using the senses and onomatopoeia, which could appear in Mr Wonka's factory and writing instructions to explain how it works! In Science we have been researching David Attenborough, Gerald Durrell and also Jane Goodall to find out what they have done to become so important to the animal world. Our Maya topic has continued with us designing our own temples and also discovering what made a great Mayan ruler! Lastly, in Geography, some fantastic work has been produced on the different layers of the rainforests and the various animals and plants which you can find there. A very busy and exciting learning time has been had!

It has been a busy start to the new half term. We are continuing to read Charlie and the Chocolate Factory in English and have invented our own chocolate machines using similes, metaphors and onomatopoeia to describe it. We also know how using all five senses in descriptive writing can improve the overall effect. In Maths we have been investigating factors, multiples and prime numbers. Our Science has moved on from plant reproduction and we are now studying animals. Our research has introduced us to naturalists such as: Gerald Durrell, Jane Goodall and David Attenborough. We have particularly enjoyed watching clips from the current BBC series 'Seven World one Planet' which has really brought the animal world to life.

Design and Technology

Pupils continue to make excellent progress with their gumball machines. They are currently marking out and assembling the mechanism that allows the gumballs to drop out of the machine. The enthusiasm and effort of the pupils remains high and very focused. The attention to detail shown by a large number of pupils is brilliant to see.

In the DT club, we have started our new project this week. Pupils will be making a mini basketball court that includes a small catapult to launch the basketball (table tennis balls) in to the net. They will make the hoop and mark it out like a real basketball court in the coming few sessions. They will then make the catapult to launch the 'basketball' in to the net. This project will allow pupils to learn about a simple mechanism and it will also allow them to get some target practice.



Art

Pupils have been set a brief where they have to design a chocolate wrapper for a new chocolate bar that Willy Wonka has created. Pupils have been asked to design the name of the bar, create suitable fonts and the relevant graphics for the wrapper. As part of their research, pupils have sketched the fonts used on the most popular chocolate bars at the moment. Currently, pupils are busy producing the initial ideas for their wrapper design.
